STAKEHOLDERS IN OBUASI MARK WORLD WATER DAY WITH AN EDUCATIONAL CAMPAIGN.

This year's celebration which was on the theme "Groundwater: Making the invisible visible", had Mr. Nixon Asante, Senior Manager, Environment, AngloGold Ashanti Obuasi stressing the need to actively sensitize, mobilize, and educate the youth and communities on the importance of groundwater. He reaffirmed AngloGold Ashanti's commitment to managing water responsibly worldwide, avoiding negative impacts on local and regional water resources.








In his remarks, Mr. Laurent Piat, Managing Director of Veolia Ghana Limited, pledged Veolia's ongoing efforts towards improving access to water resources, preserving available resources, and replenish them. Veolia Ghana contracted in 2019 by AngloGold Ashanti Limited, part of the South African headquartered gold mining company, AngloGold Ashanti, the world's third largest gold producer, operates and maintains water treatment plants for Anglogold Obuasi Mine, four water treatment plants and two drinking water treatment plants. He noted that Veolia is fully engaged as a long-term partner of Anglogold Ashanti Obuasi Mine, and is determined to have a positive impact on water but also outside the mine.

The Obuasi Municipal Chief Executive, Hon. Elijah Adansi Bonnah lauded all stakeholders for the joint initiative saying the contamination of surface freshwater destroys groundwater, which affects humans and other living things that depend on water for survival.

Nana Kwamu Kwakye II, representative of the Adansihene, commended the Obuasi mine and the collaborating partners for a thoughtful initiative. "It is extremely obvious that the mine is doing something different and right since its launch" he noted. He encouraged the continuation of the public education on the sustainable management of water. "We, as traditional leaders, promise to be attentive to the geographical locations of water bodies, be cautious on how we demarcate lands and do all we can to protect the water we drink" said Nana Kwamu Kwakye II.



The local media houses offered free airtime for public education on the importance of groundwater, open defecation free society, 'galamsey' impact of water bodies, climate change spillage of oils and chemicals. agrochemicals, and indiscriminate land use patterns on groundwater. About One Hundred and Fifty Junior High School Pupils with teachers from selected schools in Obuasi supported to embark on a site visit to the Anyinam Water Plant as part of this World year's Water Day commemoration.

The objective of this initiative was to help understand students the importance of water conservation. Personalities present at the Grand durbar were Paramount Queen Mother of Adansi, Nana Amoanimaa Dede II, traditional leaders (Odikros), Assembly members from both Obuasi Municipal and Obuasi East District Assemblies and students from selected schools. World Water Day is used to call for action to tackle the global water crisis, in support of Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 6: water and sanitation for all by 2030.
